




# 76 day passage from Ontonagon, Michigan on Lake Superior to Fort Pierce City Marina, on the Atlantic Coast of Florida

I departed the Port of Ontonagon, Michigan on Lake Superior on August 1, 2012 and arrived at the City Marina, Fort Pierce, Florida on October 15, 2012, a passage of 76 days by water on a small sailboat.

Marie, St. Mary's River, Lake Huron, Presque Isle, Harrisville, Harbor Beach, St. Clair, Detroit River, Detroit, Lake Erie, Put-in-Bay, Loraine, Fairport, Conneaut, Dunkirk, Buffalo NY, Erie Canal, Hudson River, Castleton-on-Hudson, Hyde Park, Stony Point, West Point, New York City, Sandy Hook, Atlantic Ocean to Atlantic City and Cape May, **Delaware Bay**, Delaware City, C&D Canal to **Chesapeake Bay**, Rock Harbor, Rock Hall, Deltaville, Hampton, Norfolk, Intracoastal Waterway, Dismal Swamp Canal, Elizabeth City, Belhaven, Oriental, Morehead, New River Inlet, Wrightsville Beach, Myrtle Beach, Charleston Beauford, Savannah, Isle of Hope, Fernandina, St. Augustine, New Smyrna Beach, Indian River, .... ## Fort Pierce on Florida's Treasure Coast

The Florida Treasure Coast area is located on the east coast of central Florida, stretching from just above Sebastian Inlet down to North Palm Beach. The name TREASURE COAST comes from the grounding of the great Spanish Treasure Fleet of 1715, on the Florida coast. The Spanish Treasure Fleet of 1715 carried wealth of such opulence as to be almost beyond anyone's wildest dreams.

In 1715, two separate Spanish fleets joined forces in Havana, Cuba. They carried three years of accumulated New World wealth – gold coins, bars, chests upon chests of silver coins, emeralds, pearls and fine Chinese porcelains and jewelry.

On 24 July 1715, in light winds, the fleet departed Cuba for Spain. As the ships passed the Florida Keys and sailed along mainland coast of Florida, the weather began to worsen. In a letter dated 19 October, 1715, one Don Miguel de Lima y Melo wrote of the disaster that followed:

The wind began to blow fresh from the ENE and taking a sounding we found we were in 50

fathoms of water. We were advised by the Captain, by a cannonshot and flags, to use what sails we could and head away from the coast until we were in deep water But we were unable to do this because the currents were pushing us towards the shore and the winds were getting stronger, as being from the wrong direction for getting away from the shore. The sun disappeared and the wind increased and increased in velocity coming from the east an ENE. The seas became very great in size, the wind continued blowing as towards shore, pushing us into shallow water. Then the wind changed to a furious hurricane and the seas become of such great size, with huge waves and being in still shallower water we were unable to sail. It soon happened that we were unable to sail at all, making bare our yards, mostly due to the wind carrying away our sails and rigging, and we at the mercy of the wind and water, always driving closer to the shore. All the ships, with the saving of mine, broke to pieces. (Translate by Dr. Eugene Lyon)

Fort Pierce is among the oldest communities on the east coast of Florida with its rich history beginning in 1837 when Lt. Benjamin K. Pierce built the fort that was the headquarters for the U.S. Army during the Seminole Indian War. After the war Fort Pierce, its accessible waterways and later Flagler's railway gave rise to commerce that would make the city the economic hub of the Treasure Coast with fishing, canning of fish, pineapple and citrus.

Main Street Fort Pierce, Inc. established in 1988 as a public-private partnership, is a comprehensive revitalization program designed to encourage economic development in conjunction with historic preservation.

From a vistor's point-of-view, Main Street Fort Pierce, Inc. has been extremely successful in restoring the historic downtown area of Fort Pierce. It is obviously an ongoing and difficult task. So far so good. I tip my had to everyone envolved.



#### North Pier, K-Dock

On the North Pier of the City Marina is K-Dock on Moore's Creek, where there are 20 slips, all occupied by sailboats. Near the dock is a support building, pictured top left. It is fairly shallow, but I understand there are plans to dredge it. There are about six boats with people living aboard on a full time basis. I think that it is a perfect place to live on a sailboat for the winter. Everyone is friendly and helpful. Who could ask for more. I had no transportation, except my bike, but people often were kind enough to take me to more distant places.




# North Pier Support Building: Washer, Dryer, Soft Drinks, Library, Restrooms, Showers

In the support building near K-Dock are two washers and two dryers, a soft drink vending machine, and a collection of donated books. Cost to wash: \$1.50 Cost to dry:\$1.75 Also restrooms and showers. Everything is kept clean and in working condition.




#### **Moore's Creek**



## **Live Aboard Tips**

As you will see, I am a beliver in the advantages of living on a small boat, for a number of practical reasons. Check out *Twenty Sail-boats to Take You Anywhere* by John Vigor.

While there is a tendency for people to get larger and larger boats, I started with a 50 footer, that I built years ago, and went smaller. A 27 foot sailboat like WINDSONG provided good live aboard conditions, with a few inexpensive additions.



### Windsong II, C&C 27

For her size, a C&C 27 has an excellent layout for living aboard. She has full headroom throughout the salon. She is perfect for one or two persons, plus a cat! More importantly, for a older boat she sails fast and can point close to the wind. She has a simple rig than can be easily handledby one person. Like most sailboats built in the 70's, she was built strong and can take a few bumps. She has minimal bright work above deck which makes maintenance easy even in a salt water environment.

Most of the boats on K-Dock are captive to a marina. That is to say, they are too large to be easily moved except by water. WINDSONG has a special trailer that on whe she an easily towed by a truck. When I leave Fort Pierce to go north for for the summer, I will just go to a marina that has a Travel-lift, drop the mast, and put her on her trailer... and she's ready to go back to Lake Superior. How good is that!

### **Heat:** Force 10 Heater, Small Electric Heater, and Oil Lamps

It doesn't take much to heat a small sailboat like WINDSONG. For serious heating I have a Force 10 kerosene heater. It is pressurized by a small hand pump. It can even be used when the boat is sailing.

At port, however, a better choice is a very small electric portable heater. I got one on sale at the Ace Hardware near the marina. It works perfectly and is safe to use. Since WINDSONG has a number of oil lamps, they also work well to take the chill off, as well as providing a wonderful atmosphere. A lot of newer boats don't have oil lamps, which is unfortunate. WINDSONG's cabin table light is a piece of art.





## Fort Pierce Weather ... Great! Wonderful!

For a person that for years has spent winters wearing a red union suit, Carhart bibs and insulated boots, weather in Fort Pierce is a big change for me. There is almost always a nice breeze on K-Dock, that keeps WINDSONG cool. Only on rare occasions a small electric was all that was needed in the evening.

## Cooling: fans, wind scoop, opening port lights

In a Florida winter I have found that I had no trouble in keeping WINDSONG comfortable. All portlights should be able to open. In many stock sailboats, the port lights (windows) are fixed. They should be replaced with opening ports. A relatively inexpensive choice are Beckson Ports. I have also used two inexpensive electric fans. They make a big difference and easily moved. If there is a breeze (common at Fort Pierce) my hatch wind scoop is effective. Good ventilation also prevents mildew problems. I have had none.



### Daily Interior Cleaning keeping everything ship shape

A place for everything and everything in its place and don't put it down, put it away. This routine is import when sailing and also living on a sailboat. Every morning I check over WINDSONG to see if everything has been put away and then I vacuum the sole (floor). Another good habit is to bring nothing aboard if it not absolutely needed. My only exception ... the Sock Monkey!



## Care and feeding of the Universal Atomic 4

As part of WINDSONG's upkeep, I start her Atomic 4 engine every other day. I also keep the fuel tank (gas) full. I also use SEAFOAM as a fuel stabilizer. I run the engine to operating temperature and shift in forward and reverse. If an engine could speak ... it would say, thank you!



### Polishing the Brass

Unlike many of the newer sailboats, WINDSONG has quite a few brass oil lamps. These include a number of cabin lamps. Most of these are the classic *Yacht Lamps* and *Atlantic lamps*. All have gimbals. The safest lamps are the Yacht Lamps that can be used under sail. Another lamp is a large anchor light that can be hung low on the boom. It can be seen much better than a small light at the top of a mast. The most decorative lamp is a large hanging lamp over the table in the salon. From time to time they all have to be polished and re-filled with lamp oil. As first mate the Sock Monkey is in charge.

### **Transportation & Fitness**

A bicycle is a must. I have two. A Citizen folding bike (that can be carried on WINDSONG) and a new trail bike. This gives me transportation not only to local stores but it is also part of a fitness regiment. I am up every day at seven and bike for an hour. A wonderful way to start the day. It is important that your bike is ALWAYS LOCKED with a security chain. A small back pack is needed.




# Flip-Flops, White Trousers w/button suspenders, Shorts

I never thought I would end up mainly wearing flip-flops, shorts and a tee-shirt. Except for special occasions the long pans have remained in the hanging locker. On my early morning bike ride a wear a big Michigan sweat shirt that I found at Goodwill. I have not worn socks and regular shoes for weeks. I do have with me a tuxedo, just to be "be prepared." I am after all an Eagle Scout!



### Wi-Fi (Wireless Fidelity)

The Fort Pierce City Marina provides an open Wi-Fi network for Internet access. A fair signal can be picked up on K-Dock. For stronger signal, one needs to get closer to the Marina Office. The tables in Marina Square south of the office is a good place to work if the sun is not too bright. The Public Library, across from the marina, also has a open Wi-Fi access. Cobb's Landing also has open access. The bench between the Marina Office and Cobb's is a good place to sit.



It is a wonderful opportunity to improve your diet. My favorites: green beans, sweet corn, asparagus, broccoli, and or course, oranges.







### **Honeybell Oranges**

Honeybell oranges are exceptionally sweet and juicy citrus fruits which only reach peak ripeness during the month of January. Also known as Minnesota tangelos, Honeybell oranges are not actually oranges at all. They are a hybrid or cross between the Darcy variety of tangerine and either the Duncan or Bowen variety of grapefruit.

This hybridization process, which some sources say can be traced back to the ancient Orient, yields a tangelo with the coloring and size of a grapefruit and the sweetness and juiciness of a tangerine.

Honeybell oranges are prized for their sweetness and relative scarcity, along with their abundant supply of juice. The Honeybell crop reaches maximum ripeness during the last weeks of January, or possibly early February. Virtually all Honeybell orange trees in the United States grow along the Indian River in Florida, and the crop yield is often regarded as unpredictable from year to year. Growers take orders for the oranges throughout the year, but can only harvest the crop during January and February.

Great care must be taken while harvesting Honeybell oranges in order to avoid damaging the distinctively bell-shaped stem end of the fruit, which actually inspired the name for the fruit itself.

They became available at the Saturday Market in late December.



### Wednesday Green Market and Food Co-Op in the Marina Square

This is a new and smaller market on the Marina Square from 2 to 6 on Wednesday. Every week is gets bigger and more organized. A musical group provides entertinment. Since I have a vegetable steamer in the galley, I can always find something fresh to buy.





### Saturday Craft Show

Across from Marina Square and the Library there is a large craft show from eight in the morning to two in the afternoon. There is a wide assortment of items for sale, from books by local authors to wood carvings, straw hats, clothing and jewelry.



brings good luck It's not a Southern meal Ham










### **Luck Jack on K-Dock**

- 4. A "pocket cruiser" that can easily be moved on a conventional trailer, is a good choice for a sailboat to live on for a few months. In the case of WINDSONG, I plan to have a friend bring down my trailer from Michigan. We haul WINDSONG at a nearby marina with a travellift, drop the mast, put her on the trailer, and off we go.

Next winter I plan to trailer PENRYN, a Robert Tucker designed bilge keel sailboat, down to the City Marina. It is smaller than WINDSONG, but is a proven sea-worthy craft. The famous solo sailor Tristan Jones sailed a vessel similar to PENRYN all over the world.

5. Living on a sailboat is very good for your health. I am up at 7 and off on a hour bike ride and watch the sun coming up. (It is afterall, the sunrise city!) Then it's back to the boat for a few oranges and grapefruit. White a nice way to start the day.



#### **Next Winter**

In *The Incredible Voyage*, the legendary sailor Tristan Jones sailed a small bilge keel sailboat SEADART on the lowest body of water in the world, the Dead Sea in Israel-and the highest, Lake Titicaca in the Andes. During this intrepid six-year voyage, he traveled a distance equal to twice the circumference of the world. His sailboat was designed by the late British designer Robert Tucker.

I own PENRYN a Ballerina design sailboat designed by Robert Tucker. She was built in Cornwall, England. She is similar to the vessel used by Jones.

Specifics: LWL: 5.10m/16'9" LOA: 6.56m/21'6"

**Beam**: 2.3m/7'5" **Draft**: 0.69m/2'6"

**Displ**.: 1,017k/2,240 lbs. **Ballast**: 362k/800 lbs.

With some modifications PENRYN would be a perfect boat to live on for a few months in Fort Pierce. She can be easily trailered down to the City Marina.

Due to a draft of less than 3 feet, PENRYN can even sail on the Intracostal, as well as on the Atlantic.
